GREEN FLAG COMMUNITY AWARD

Our reserves were judged for this in May and we have just learned that we have again received this award. PATHWAY APPLICATION – another word from Norman

We have always considered the steep entrance to the Markham Road site to be unsuitable for wheelchair and pushchair use or for those with mobility problems. It is certainly dangerous when leaving this Reserve and this has been raised on several occasions by the Green Flag judges. Last year on behalf of the Friends I applied for Lottery funding to replace the existing path with a more user-friendly incline. As you will recall we were unsuccessful in our bid owing to the fact that we did not own the land. In January this year I spent many hours again with Chris Riley from Broxtowe Borough Council completing a new application, this time to Nottinghamshire County Council for the Local Improvement Scheme Capital Funding. Sad to say this bid has also been rejected. I suspect in this economic climate they have to select projects that benefit the greatest number of people. It is not my intention at this stage to consider further applications.

WORKING SESSIONS REPORT APRIL TO JUNE 2018

The April session fell on Easter Sunday so the turnout was low but normal service was resumed in May and June with our average of 12 volunteers. In April the snowdrops near the Sandy Lane entrance were split up and replanted to cover a larger area and tree and shrub debris was removed from the Markham Rd reserve. In May we installed another step in the steep part of the path leading down from the viewpoint, more shrubs and branches were removed and some pathways cleared. Some of the rosebay willow herb was cut back in June; whilst this is attractive it is also invasive and needs controlling every few years. Many minor paths were cleared to make access easier. On all three sessions we did the usual litter picking.

WILDFLOWER AREAS and FIRE DAMAGE

The two wildflower areas were not rotovated until almost the middle of May and although we sowed seed four days afterwards we then had probably the hottest and driest few weeks, still continuing. Consequently the areas have mostly been a bit of a disaster and the few plants that struggled to grow soon withered in the heat apart from some colourful cornflowers on the Thoresby Road grassy area. There have also been two fairly serious fires on Alexandrina Plantation which have destroyed mostly gorse and grass. In both cases the fire brigade attended promptly. When we get some rain much of the two areas affected will re-grow. Let's just hope we don't suffer any more fires but the whole area is very vulnerable at present.
